

# William G Pomeroy Foundation Patriot Burials Marker Grants

## Sample Application

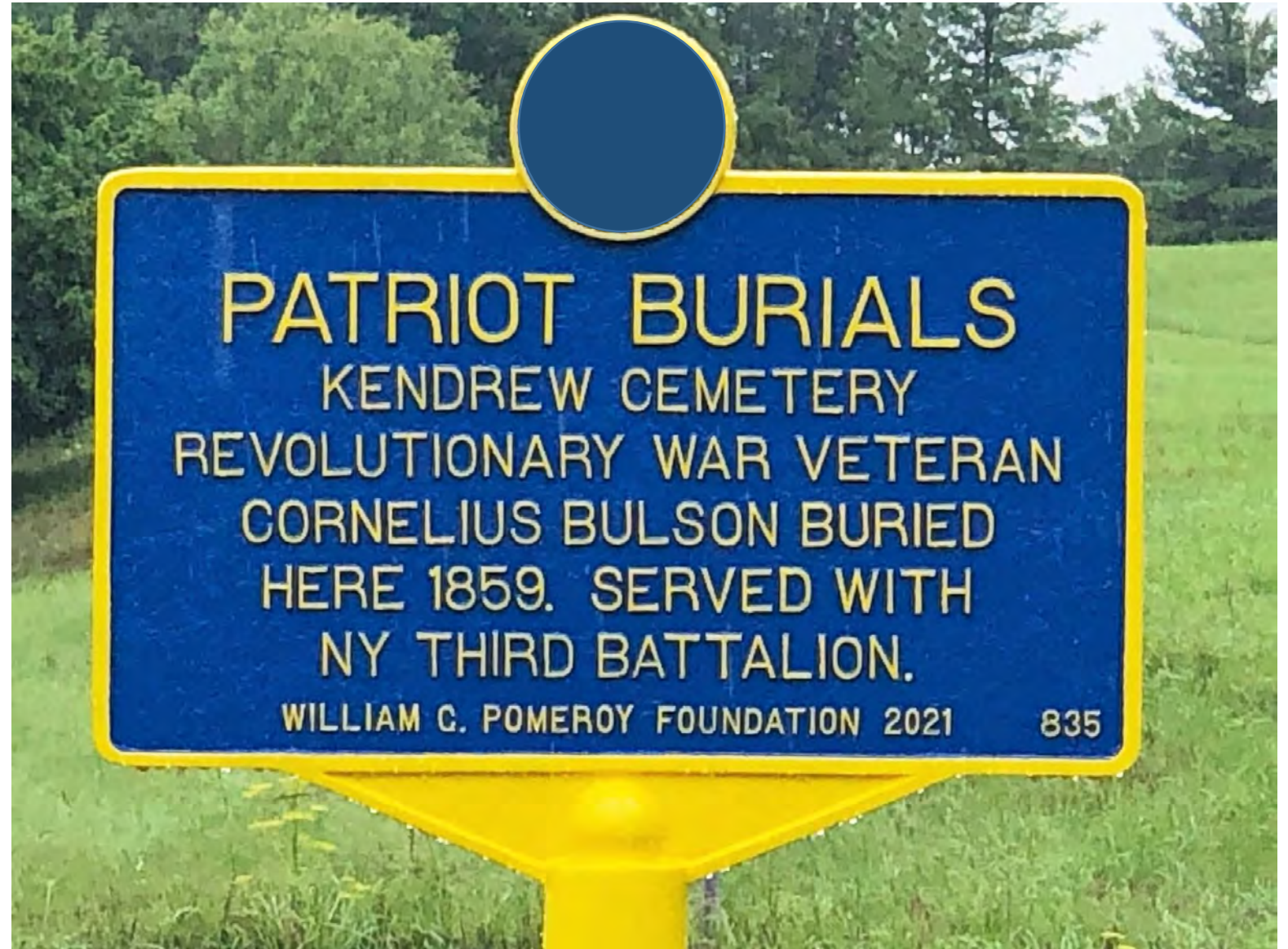
Please submit all questions and information to [PatriotBurialMarkers@IndianaSAR.org](mailto:PatriotBurialMarkers@IndianaSAR.org). The William G Pomeroy Foundation will only accept questions and applications through the Indiana Society liaison.

The first round of grant applications for 2023 will begin on February 20<sup>th</sup> when the Letter of Intent session opens through March 20<sup>th</sup>. All prospective applications must be submitted to the Indiana Society liaison no later than 15 March to give time to upload the information to the Pomeroy Foundation website. Here are questions that must be answered and provided to the liaison:

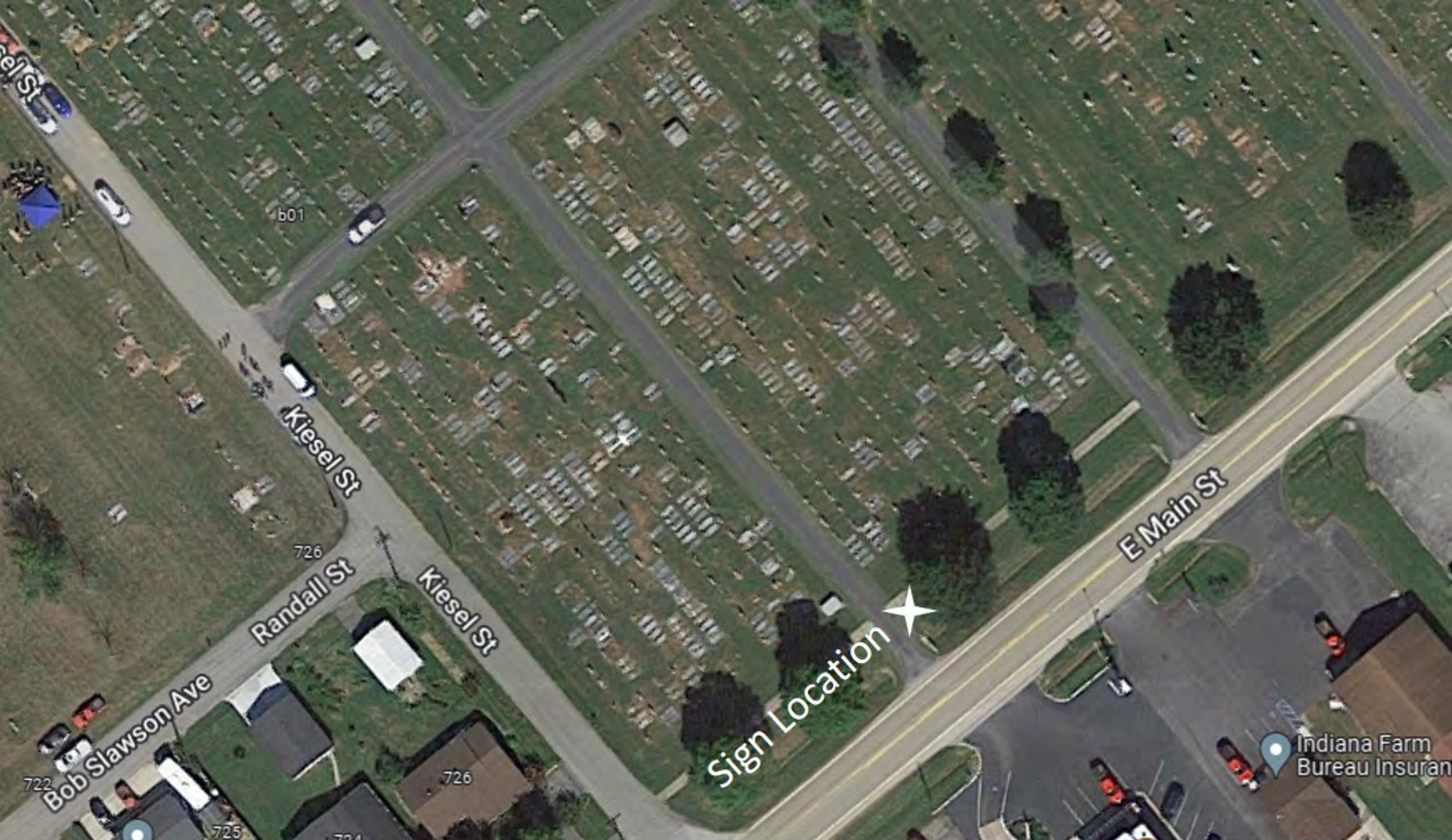
- 1) **Provide your Proposed Verbiage for the Marker:** There are five lines of twenty seven characters (spaces and punctuation count) that you can suggest. A photo example of a sign is attached. The top and bottom lines are mandatory entries. If you are honoring several Patriots in a cemetery, then finding the earliest date of burials can be located using the Indiana State Historical Architectural and Archeological Research Database (SHAARD) <https://secure.in.gov/apps/dnr/shaard/guest.html>.
- 2) **Discuss what types of signs and structures are currently in the cemetery:** First and foremost, if there is already signage referring and talking about the Patriots in the cemetery, then do not request grant funds for one of these markers. You have 500 characters to explain what is in the cemetery, so be succinct.
- 3) **Obtain a Permission from the Cemetery Owner:** This is required and preferably on their organizational letterhead, if available. We recommend you obtain this, prior to making the effort to apply for a marker to ensure it does not become a hurdle later on in the application process. If you have to cross some else's property to get to the cemetery, that permission is also required. An example of a permission letter is attached.
- 4) **GPS Coordinates and Address of the Proposed Site of the Sign:** While discussing with the property owner, ensure you get an exact location to place the marker and provide GPS coordinates, address, county, city and township as well as provide a map making the proposed location. Ensure the marker will not be installed on a road easement. An example is attached.
- 5) **Provide Primary Sources as Proof of the Patriots Service or Patriotism and Burial within the Cemetery:** Proof for each Patriot must be provided and all attempts to identify every Patriot within the cemetery must be made. A photo of the Patriots original period headstone should be provided and if no headstone exist, then documented proof a burial in the cemetery must be included. You must provide primary copies of the original documentation for the Patriots service or patriotism. Transcribed documents will not suffice. You have 1,500 characters to provide information to referenced documents such as Pension S 123456, Pay Vouchers of Charles County, Court Documents, Research Books, etc. Examples are attached.

- 6) **What is the Historical Significance of this Request:** Briefly describe in 250 characters or less the historical significance of your proposed marker.
- 7) **Why was this site selected:** List why the marker is being installed at this location. Example, home of person being commemorated, person being commemorated is buried here, site of former building of the person being commemorated, etc.
- 8) **In One or Two Sentences Describe what is being Commemorated:**
- 9) **Provide Additional Cemetery Location Details:** Please be as specific as possible. For example: inside cemetery, in front of house, southeast corner of X Street and Y Avenue.
- 10) **Sign Installation:** If the grant application is approved, the William G Pomeroy Foundation will forward a check to the Indiana Society Treasurer who will then write one to the foundry listed on the order form provided to you. A delivery address for the sign will be needed, so please provide that with the original documentation for the application. Any costs associated with installing the sign are to be borne by the requesting chapter (essentially a bag of Sacrete dumped dry into the hole for the post and ensure its plum upright).
- 11) **Plan for a Dedication Ceremony and Publicity:** Although this is not a part of the grant application process, it should be considered in the planning and coordination stages. Ensure the property owner understands there will be a public ceremony once the marker is installed. Ensure you provide enough time to coordinate with the Indiana Society liaison so the William G Pomeroy Foundation can provide a person or greetings for the event. All publicity for the marker and event, must include the Indiana Society and the William G Pomeroy Foundation. Photos on Facebook and other social media should have the hashtag #williamgpomeroyfoundation.

to obtain the benefit of this act of Congress  
passed June 7th 1832

That he entered the service under the  
following named officers and served as stated  
in the following that he volunteered under  
Captain W<sup>m</sup>. Underwood in Sevier County in  
the state of North Carolina before I volunteered  
I was <sup>in</sup> Captain Woodruff's company of County  
Hatteras, but I found the Volunteers under Cap<sup>n</sup>  
Underwood as stated before the two companies  
was disbanded on the <sup>10th</sup> month of January 1831  
and another company the name of the Captain  
not recollect under Maj<sup>r</sup> Winston we Vol-  
unteered for Six months tour our Battalion  
was ordered to march on to the south to capture  
Gen<sup>l</sup> Morgan then; a few days this was before the  
battle of the company, we marched in the direction  
of the Company on through with <sup>company</sup> to a creek  
call'd Hanging Creek one of the branches of  
Catawba river and there received the news of  
the success of Gen<sup>l</sup> Morgan & Col Washington  
we Disbanded and we was ordered back to Gen<sup>l</sup>

Green to reconquer him who was retreating from  
Boon wallace; Genl Morgan, Mann army  
did join Genl Green and except Dan comes in  
the edge of Virginia after; when Cornwallis had  
back to Hillsborough Col. Patton was over on the  
Blue River, and a place called White Sulphur  
a detachment of the British fell in with us  
twice as strong as our and the order of our Ma-  
jor Mervator was to us to save ourselves by re-  
treat we then did retreat in the direction  
of Genl Green's army but we was unable to  
to join Genl Morgan and Green until after the  
battle of Guilford Courthouse which was in  
the first part of the month of March, having been  
intercepted by the British; they were still  
in the country around; Genl Green marched  
on to the South and Cornwallis marched  
on to Petersburg, soon after the battle of  
Guilford <sup>we found Green;</sup> our time was out <sup>the</sup> 10 of July in 1781  
being a Six months tour as a Volunteer a  
part of my time of service I was sick and left  
on the road so when the company was disch-  
I could not <sup>be there</sup> on account of my being sick; and I  
never applied to the Captain for a written dis-  
-charge after, is the reason I have no discharge  
I have no documentary evidence of my service  
and I do not know of any living witness by whom  
I can prove it by; and have to prove it entirely by  
my own oath; my Capt was alive a few years  
since but I have understood that he is now dead  
As a reason why I have not applied sooner I  
can offer two reasons one is I had only served  
a Six months tour and knew the allowance

would be very small and I was in a school  
at that time to live without it; but the main  
reason was I have had very acquainted and  
very much out of the way of correct information  
was informed that I would have to prove the  
actual services by two witnesses and I did  
not know where to find them the only one  
that lived near me that I know of died about  
the passage of the law and I give it up not  
expecting to be able to prove my services  
I was born in Sussex County, State of Virginia  
moved to Surry County, North Carolina when I was  
and lived about thirty <sup>six</sup> years on Thom's Creek  
I was sixteen years old when I moved there and  
found the service soon after; then I moved to this  
County and remained some years & moved to Indiana  
and back again to this County have lived twenty  
four years here and in Indiana together Joseph  
Peter was my lieutenant and Samuel Caloway was  
the ensign in our Company he hereby relinquished  
- is every claim to a pension or annuity except  
this present and declares that his name is not  
on the pension roll of the agency of any State  
and has no agent or attorney except his present  
agent D. A. Bell of Tazewell & Fox sworn to  
and subscribed the day and year aforesaid
